The Whyte Brothers - Landcare Pioneers

Long before Landcare as we know it began bringing groups together to care for the land there were individuals whose foresight and actions paved the way for the Landcare movement of future years.

We were reminded of this while chatting to Ed and Leo Whyte from Baranduda. They were attending the recent KCLG Soil Health Workshop at the Kergunyah Hall and Lindsay was reminiscing with them about their Uncle Hugh Whyte, who in 1983, along with his brothers John and Kevin Whyte had won the inaugural ABC National Tree Care Award. This award was set up to encourage landholders to plant trees. The Tree Care Award then became the National Landcare awards to cast a wider net for environmental protection and has developed into the network we have today. Next year will be the 40th year since the inaugural award to the Whyte Brothers of Baranduda.

This award recognized their achievements in planting trees on their property at Baranduda and in particular the Slope Guards which they had devised as a means to stop cattle rubbing against the fences.





Whyte Brothers' initial attempts to re-grow trees on their farm came out of necessity and began well before Tree Care arrived. Realising that they had used timber for fencing, yards, houses and heating, they began to replace these trees.

After collecting seed and growing mainly natives, their plantations were protected from stock by a sloping tree guard which was easier and quicker to erect than strainer posts. The idea was to attach hand tight barb onto steel posts sloping inwards toward the trees so that stock would connect the barb with their fetlocks and not push the fence in any further!

The second part of the replanting plan was to maintain those tree guards for the life of the tree so stock could not access the trees but still benefit from shade and protection.

The results are now evident with large plantations of aged trees on the farm as the next generation continue to plant and protect trees, not all with sloping tree guards!

Further research reveals the Whytes long history in growing trees as back in 1945 Hugh Whyte wrote to the Border Mail recommending that a Native Tree Nursery be established in Albury to be prepared for reafforestation plans in the district.

A further letter was written to the paper in support of Mr. Whyte's suggestion by Lindsay's grandfather Mr. A. E. Jarvis. In which he stated that the establishment of a nursery for native trees should be given the highest priority by every landholder in the district. He states that every landholder is aware that we have ring-barked too many trees and the only way to recall this is to plant the seedlings of native trees. His final recommendation was that such a nursery could be more effectively located in Baranduda rather than Albury.

The descendants of these men are still actively involved in looking after the landscapes on their family properties today and Liz Fuchsen, is the President of Our Native Garden in Wodonga, coordinating volunteers in propagating and planting native trees. Thanks to Liz, Leo and Eddie for sharing your story.




What's coming up in our region

Pilot Soils Monitoring and Testing Program - EOI Register now open

The Australian Government is providing \$54.4 million over two years to support farmers and land managers to access low-cost soil sampling and certified testing in exchange for sharing their data under the Pilot Soil Monitoring and Incentives Program.

Farmers and land managers may be eligible for benefits of up to \$10,000 and receive assistance from Commonwealth-funded soil extension officers to interpret their soil test results.

Southern Cross University has been engaged to deliver the program, including arranging soil sampling and testing for land managers who have successfully applied for assistance.

My Victorian Waterway Survey - closes 17th April 2022

The My Victorian Waterway Survey is social research being conducted by the Victoria's Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP).

The survey is for any Victorian who visits a waterway, and it seeks to find out how you use Victoria's waterways, what you value about them, and what your vision is for healthy waterways. The term 'waterway' used in the survey refers to any river, stream, creek, floodplain, wetland, estuary, lake, water storage or reservoir. The survey is anonymous.

Open: the survey is open from 23 March to 17 April 2022 and should take only 10 minutes to complete.

Access the survey: via My Victorian Waterway Survey link and it can also be found on water.vic.gov.au

Responses to the survey will help DELWP understand what the community's vision is for how waterways are managed, and how Victorian's use their waterways and what they value about them. This survey will build on data collected in the My Victorian Waterway Survey (2009) to identify trends in waterway use, perceptions, and knowledge over time. DELWP has used responses from the 2009 survey to inform government policy, decision-making and investments.

Young Farmers Scholarship - closes Monday 18th April 2022

The 2022 Upskill and Invest - Young Farmers Scholarships are now open for applications.

You could receive up to \$10,000! Each scholarship recipient is eligible to receive up to \$5,000 for training and study (Upskill), followed by up to \$5,000 to put their new skills into practice (Invest).

If you are aged 35 years or younger, and have at least two years' experience on-farm, you could be eligible to apply. To find out more visit vic.gov.au/youngfarmers.

The scholarship program builds on the commitments of the Agriculture Strategy to grow, modernise and promote the sector - helping to deliver the agriculture skills of the future and building on the Government's goal to grow Victoria's agriculture sector to \$20 billion by 2030.

Applications close at midnight on Monday 18 April 2022.

Strengthening Rural Communities Grant Opportunity - closes 31st May 2022

The Strengthening Rural Communities (SRC) program aims to give the thousands of small remote, rural and regional communities across Australia an opportunity to access funding to support broad community needs.

Grants are available for a broad range of grassroots, community-led initiatives that directly and clearly benefit local communities. Applications are accepted on an ongoing basis and assessed quarterly.
